Introduction

Congratulations on deciding to celebrate this special occasion using our services. We aim to help you make the event a special one to remember and cherish.

In this booklet you will find details for the day, suggested readings and a checklist to help you prepare. It outlines what to expect, explains the choices you need to make and is a reminder of what to do on the day.

Naming ceremonies

The naming of your child is one of the most important decisions a parent has to make. A name gives a child an identity and provides a sense of belonging to the family and wider community. A naming ceremony is a unique occasion for all your family and friends to feel involved as they offer their love and support for your child's future development.

Naming ceremonies are as individual as your child and provide a formal, non religious way to celebrate their birth, welcome them into the family, announce their names, choose adults to provide a special supportive relationship to your child and to make promises of commitment.

Naming ceremonies are not just for babies. Children of any age can have a ceremony and you can include your other children at no extra charge. A naming ceremony can also be used to welcome adoptive and/or step children into your family and to announce the new relationship.

Any parent can arrange a naming ceremony whether married or not.



Renewal of vows ceremonies

A renewal of vows ceremony is a special way for couples to celebrate and renew the original vows they made to each other. For some this is a unique opportunity to celebrate a special anniversary, be it their first or 50th. For others it helps to confirm their commitment to one another in celebrating their years together and affirming their strength and unity as a couple. Couples who marry abroad may also wish to confirm their vows on their return or it could simply be a personal gesture to share your love for one another. Whatever your individual reasons are it is a unique way to celebrate the occasion with friends and family.

Renewal of vows ceremonies are as individual as you and provide a formal, non religious way to celebrate your vows to one another again, to share this commitment to one another with your friends and family, to make your promises and vows anew and to have special guests to contribute to your special day.

Renewal of vows ceremonies are for any couples who are legally married or in a civil partnership. There are no limits on length of marriage, age or where you live or where married originally.

Planning your ceremony

We will provide a framework for you to select your ceremony from. To ensure your ceremony is something unique and special to you. Your ceremony will be run by a fully trained celebrant from your local authority and contain some, or all, of the following:-

- Introduction and welcome
- Readings/poems
- Promises and pledges
- Exchange of gifts / rings
- Your own music
- Closing words
- Signing of a commemorative certificate

You need to think about your special day and how you wish to personalise it. You need to decide what guests to invite and most importantly the special guests who will act as your witnesses or honorary parents. You also have to choose readings. We have included a small selection but you are free to select something more personal, or write a poem, or additional promises or words if you wish, please send a copy with your checklist.

Naming and renewal of vows ceremonies have no legal status and cannot be used to change a name.

Planning your ceremony

Ceremonies can be held at the Register Office in our ceremony room or at any of our approved venues across Milton Keynes. Please visit our website for details and fees www.miltonkeynes.gov.uk/registrars

How many guests

Our venue can hold 60 guests in total, this includes you, children and your special guests. Our other approved venues do differ so you will need to confirm guest numbers with them directly but it would be helpful for us to know approximate numbers.

You will need to decide who will be your witnesses/honorary parents. For renewal of vows your witnesses will sit at the front to hear you say your vows and sign the certificate at the end of the ceremony. For naming ceremonies honorary parents will make promises to provide a special supportive relationship to your child and sign the certificate at the end of the ceremony. You may choose other special guests to deliver a poem/reading.

Photos and video

You are welcome to take photos or video your ceremony however we ask that this is done discreetly. We do not want you or our celebrant distracted during your ceremony as we want you to get the best out of your celebration.

Parking and grounds

We have no parking at our venue so ask that you organise yourself and guests where possible to travel together. If you are using one of our approved venues please check arrangements with them.

We have a no smoking policy in our venues and garden (this includes electronic devices).

On the day ...

On the day we need you to arrive 30 minutes before your ceremony at your chosen venue. This gives everyone time to get settled and seated before we begin. Our celebrant will then conduct your ceremony by welcoming everyone who is sharing this celebration with you. They will then guide you through the rest of your ceremony including the readings, introducing people as necessary and conduct the promises with you and your special guests. This takes about 30 minutes. You are then free to continue your celebrations as planned.

What you need to do now ...

We now need you to return your contract if you haven't already done so, please then complete the checklist at the back of the booklet and return it to us at least two weeks before your ceremony. If you have your own music it needs to be sent to us on a CD at the same time along with any additional readings, poems or words. Our address is on the back of this booklet.

Together we will ensure you have a special ceremony to remember and cherish for years to come.

We look forward to helping you celebrate your special day and thank you for choosing to use our services.



Readings for naming ceremonies
