
Why cities for all?

Setting the context

In cities across the world, marginal groups of all ages and gender identities face a range of barriers and vulnerabilities. In the world of urban planning and design, expectations are rising.

Barriers and vulnerabilities are made worse by global drivers of change such as climate change, rapid urbanisation, wars and conflicts.

An historic bias is built into our urban spaces. Across countries, cities have been largely designed without considering the diverse needs of all groups of society from women, children to LGTBQ.

Why cities for women?

Setting the context

- In the UK, **97% of young women** have experienced sexual harassment in public.
- In Ireland, **55% of women** feel unsafe travelling on public transport after dark.
- In India, only **20% of women** are employed.
- One in three women globally do not have access to high quality, inclusive, and safe toilets that meet their needs.
- Across the EU, women earn **37% less** than men.
- Only 2-3% of statues across the world represent women.
- Globally, only **29% of women** are in senior decision-making positions.

Urgent action is needed to remove the gender bias built into cities and improve women's safety, their health, and access to education and employment. lack of awareness as te where to go when




