Did you know MK City Council spends over £3.5million* per annum keeping MK clean and tidy? And that figure doesn't include all the great work done by members of the public, community groups, local Parish and Town councils!

Litter not only makes an area look unsightly, but the <u>RSPCA regularly receives reports</u> about wild animals caught up or injured by litter too.

*This figure includes staff costs, vehicle running costs and equipment (but does not include the cost of disposal) for litter picking, street cleansing, fly-tipping, and leaf clearance in MK.

What is MK City Council doing to help tackle littering?

- <u>All council owned public land</u> should be cleaned on <u>at least an eight weekly basis</u>. Some areas will be visited more frequently, receiving fortnightly or even daily visits, especially around schools, shops and areas of high footfall.
- employs <u>litter wardens</u> to monitor and fine residents caught littering, dog fouling or fly tipping.
- provides <u>free litter posters and resources</u>.
- gives guidance and support to the provision of litter pick kits to residents.
- will be changing to <u>wheelie bins</u> for collection of rubbish and recycling in 2023, which will help to reduce the amount of litter from torn and discarded recycling and rubbish sacks.

As an Eco Champion what can I do to help?

Plastic dropped as litter is most harmful as it breaks down releasing toxic chemicals into the environment, causing long lasting <u>harm to animals</u> and our ecosystem. The UK government has recently agreed that from October 2023, a range of single-use plastics will be <u>banned</u> including cutlery and food containers.

It's important that we try and reduce the amount of single use plastics we use and dispose of our litter responsibly, so always:

- carry a reusable bottle and/or coffee cup
- when having a picnic use reusable tubs for sandwiches and snacks. Swap to reusable cutlery too
- use a bag for life
- place all litter in the bin, or
- if the bin is full take the litter home to dispose of

Good news stories

Litter picks can be held anytime of year, and our Eco Champions are out in force helping to get things sorted. So far we have heard from:

Two Mile Ash Parish volunteer litter pickers who collected 22 bags of rubbish in just two hours

Wolverton Litter pickers held a Big Pick with over 30 volunteers collecting 69 bags of litter!



Shenley Brook End and Tattenhoe Parish council, Serco staff and local residents set to work clearing undergrowth in Rosemullion Avenue, Tattenhoe (pictured) including:

- at least 6 blue boxes of wine bottles
- over 30 bags of general rubbish
- several empty drums of cooking oil
- a couple of dozen metal bars and chunks of rubble
