

Impact and equalities assessment – Proposed new all through school at the new development area known as Milton Keynes East

As prescribed by section 9 of the Academies Act 2010 and section 149 of the Equality Act 2010, the local authority must assess the potential impact of any new school on existing educational provision in the area. The local authority must also consider whether the new school would impact on any groups with protected characteristics.

This Impact and Equalities Assessment has been created due to the proposal to open a new all through school (academy) in the new development area of Milton Keynes known as Milton Keynes East (MK East) due to open in September 2027 (primary phase only). This school is being established as a result of significant demand for school places due to the housing developments in the area.

Conclusions of the Impact and Equalities Assessment

Impact on the population of Milton Keynes

The Impact and Equalities Assessment (IEA) concludes that the proposals will not adversely affect people living in Milton Keynes.

In assessing the impacts of the proposal on people with protected characteristics the IEA found that they had a positive effect on all protected characteristics other than pregnancy and maternity where no adverse impact was found.

While the IEA found a positive impact on religion or belief, it notes that the Regional Schools Commissioner may decide that this school should be sponsored by an academy trust with a particular religious focus which could impact on school admissions and whether or not to admit a child on the basis of religion or belief. However, the LA would be seeking assurances throughout the application and assessment process of the competition on how the trust would cater for all religions as it is envisaged that the school would be inclusive of all faiths in order to serve and cater for the new local diverse community that the school will be located in,

The LA are seeking a sponsor that will provide excellent support facilities to meet the needs of all children. They will provide support for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, Looked After Children, those with pupil premium funding and any other disadvantaged groups. The sponsor must have a drive for excellent outcomes in attendance, attainment and achievement for all children and a clear commitment to closing the gaps between pupil groups.

Impact on neighbouring schools

Population data and projections show that significant additional capacity is required within the MK East area of Milton Keynes over the next five years and beyond which has resulted in a decision to propose the new school provision.



The projections taking account of historic and current pupil numbers, underlying demographics and the expected pupil yield from new housing show that a shortfall in places in the area can be expected from September 2027 onwards. This shortfall of places would continue to rise, largely due to the impacts of new housing, from 2027 onwards without the introduction of additional provision. The proposal would have no adverse impact on schools already existing within this area of Milton Keynes as the school will grow slowly in line with additional demand from housing development and in partnership with neighbouring schools to eliminate any adverse impact on the schools already existing within the local area.

Upon review there are no negative impacts that will arise from a new school being commissioned in the area to meet demand. Therefore, the new school option has been chosen to ensure the LA continues to meet its statutory duty for school place sufficiency and to help ensure that children are provided with access to high quality local education provision for all catchment children in the future.

Impact and Equalities assessment (IEA): Proposal to open a new primary school at the new development area known as Milton Keynes East (MK East)

Section 1. What this IEA about?

A proposal to establish a new mainstream all through school to primarily serve the MK East development in Milton Keynes. The school will include a 24 place SEND unit for secondary pupils with a Communication and Interaction designation. It will also include a 39 place nursery. It is intended that the new school will be a free school (a state-funded school, operating as an academy, independent of the local authority) in accordance with Department for Education guidance. A period of consultation with the community has already been carried out and further statutory consultations will be carried out post school award.

Section 2. Why is this being proposed?

The council has a statutory duty to ensure there are sufficient school places in the area. There are currently no schools in the MK East area of Milton Keynes. Schools located in Newport Pagnell will support the development in the early stages but will not be sufficient to support the development as it grows. Over the coming years these existing schools will reach their operational capacity. With significant continued housing development in the area over the next ten years, additional provision is required to meet growing demand in the area.

We also have a statutory duty in respect of early years and SEND provision both of which will be supported by the delivery of this proposal.



Section 3. What will change?

It is proposed that a new all through school in the MK East area of Milton Keynes will be established with effect from September 2027, initially opening with the primary phase. The secondary phase will open at a later date to be determined. The age range of the school will be 2 to 18 years (Reception to Year 11), eventually providing places for 630 pupils in Year R to Year 6 (three forms of entry), 1500 places for pupils in Year 7 to Year 11, including nursery provision for 2 to 4 year old and a 24 place secondary SEND unit for pupils with a Communication and Interaction designation. The school will provide places for boys and girls (mixed). If the proposal is approved, the academy trust chosen to operate the school would determine the oversubscription criteria for admission purposes. To help with a swift opening, for at least the first two years of operation, the admission arrangements for the school must be in line with the admission arrangements for maintained schools in Milton Keynes.

The proposed new school will provide additional school place capacity that will primarily serve the MK East development in Milton Keynes. It is proposed that the new school should have a defined catchment area based on the boundaries of the new development sites. This would mean that for admission purposes, residents of the new development would have priority for places in the event of oversubscription. This enables the new school to best serve its immediate local area/community.

Section 4. Consultation?

A preliminary consultation was held on specific aspects of the proposal including type of school, age range, opening profile etc. to support with the creation of the new school specification. This six-week consultation ran from 17 March 2025 to 27 April 2025 with consultation documents being distributed to a wide range of stakeholders. In total, five responses to the consultation were received. No objections were raised about the need for additional provision in the area. One respondent felt that there was a need for more SEND provision than is being proposed. However, current SEND projections do not indicate there is need for additional provision to meet local demand above what is being initially proposed. SEND provision is considered as part of the council's SEND place planning strategy and monitored via the established Specialist Provision Place Planning Group. The group will continue to monitor the position as the development continues to grow. A summary of responses is included at Annex A. A further consultation will be conducted - the formal statutory consultation, which sponsors are required to undertake under section 10 of the Academies Act 2010, takes place during the preopening phase of the school i.e. after the sponsor has been selected.

Section 7- Summary
