Intentionally blank

Apply on time

- The closing date is 15 January 2026
- Any applications received after this date will be processed in the 2nd round after the majority of places have been allocated
- A late application therefore means you are much less likely to get what you want
- Notifications of the places offered will be made on 16 April 2026 (unless your application is late)

Apply online

- You can only apply online between
 2 September 2025 and 15 January
 2026
- You will be able to view, update, submit / resubmit and check the status of your application throughout the process
- Notification of the place allocated will be quicker and your application will be secure
- You will be able to log on from 16
 April 2026 to view the school that has been allocated

Use all four preferences

- You could disadvantage yourself if you don't use your opportunity to express a preference for four schools
- Each preference is considered in its own right, so give yourself four separate chances, the schools do not know the order you have put the preferences
- If more than one school is able to offer your child a place the order of preference is important, so ensure you list the schools in the order that you want them considered

Apply on time

- Understand the school's over subscription criteria
- Improve your understanding of your chance of success by looking at the point when schools turned down applications last year
- Don't assume you will be allocated a place at your catchment school if you don't state it as one of your preferences
- Don't assume your child will get priority just because they attend a school nursery
- Consider how you will access your school place

Section A

General Information

How school admissions works

There are two ways to apply:

- 1. Normal Entry Your child starts Reception (Year R) in September after their 4th birthday or children moving from Infant School (Year 2) on to Junior School (Year 3)
 - We'll either handle your application or send it to the relevant admissions authority.
 - Some schools may ask you to also fill in their own supplementary form.
- **2. In-Year Application** This is for children joining at any other time—whether it's later in Reception or in any year up to Year 6.

If your child needs to join a primary school during the year, please apply through the online Citizen's Portal on the Milton Keynes City Council website.

- In some cases, you can apply directly to the school you'd like your child to attend.
- For full details, visit the council's website where the in-year process is explained.

Primary school admissions 2026

This booklet is for families with:

- Children starting school for the first time If your child was born between 1 September 2021 and 31
 August 2022, they'll be starting Reception Year in September 2026.
- Infant school children moving on to junior school If your child was born between 1 September
 2018 and 31 August 2019, they'll be transferring to a junior school after Year 2.

All across the country, children starting school or moving up to junior school receive their school place offer on the same day—this is called **National Offer Day**. In Milton Keynes:

- The City Council organises admissions for all primary schools, both in and outside the council's area.
- Every school's admissions team works with the council—and neighbouring councils too—to make sure each child gets ONE school place offer.
- An offer will be made at the highest possible preference on your application.

The process

If you live in Milton Keynes and your child is:

- Starting school for the first time (Reception), or
- Moving from Year 2 to junior school in September 2026,

You need to send your application to Milton Keynes City Council—regardless of the council area your preferred school is in.

How to apply

- You can apply for a school place online and follow the timeline in this guide.
- All offers will be sent out on National Offer Day.
- If you prefer, you can request a paper application form instead.

Living outside Milton Keynes?

- If you live outside Milton Keynes but want to apply for a school within the area, apply through the council where you live.
- After the deadline, your local council will work with Milton Keynes City Council to check school availability.
- Applications are reviewed using the admissions criteria set by the schools.

Visiting schools

- Not all primary schools hold open evenings—it's up to each individual school.
- To find out what's available:
 - Check the school's website, or
 - Call the school's office. Staff can confirm any visit options and may provide a school prospectus.

Important dates – what happens when?

Starting primary school – Reception Year

- Children are admitted in September prior to their fifth birthday.
- So if your child was born between 1 September 2021 and 31 August 2022, they'll start school in September 2026.

Transferring to junior/primary school

- This applies to children in infant schools (age 4–7).
- They transfer the September after their seventh birthday.
- So children born between 1 September 2018 and 31 August 2019 will also move up to year 3 in September 2026.

What happens next?

Child's home address requirements

To apply for a school place, the council requires that:

- Your child's home address is where they normally live—not somewhere they stay occasionally.
- The property must be owned, rented, or leased by the child's parent or legal guardian.
- If the child lives elsewhere under legal care (e.g. foster care), evidence must be provided.

What the council would not normally accept:

- Families claiming two main residences (they'll check which is the main residence).
- Only part of the family moving—unless it's due to divorce or permanent separation, evidence will be required. Children living apart from parents/carers—unless it's a verified fostering arrangement.
- Overcrowded living arrangements with no formal record (e.g. two families in one unsuitable property).

Verification and checks

- If there's doubt, the council will request proof of residence.
- They may check details with other agencies.
- If a school place was offered based on false or misleading information, (for example, a false claim to living in a catchment area) and this denied a place to another child, the offer of that place will be withdrawn by the admission authority for the school. This has happened in previous years.

Planning to move house?

You'll need to give the new address as part of your child's school application. Please update this on the application and keep the Access to Education team informed of the progress of your house move.

What counts as proof of your new address?

- The council requires confirmation that your house move is legally binding. A solicitor's letter confirming you've exchanged contracts on a purchased property and the move-in date.
- Or, a signed rental agreement from an approved letting agency showing you'll live at the new address on 1 September 2026.
- If you're building a house, you'll need legal documents showing when it will be ready and when you'll be resident in the property. This must be received by 15 January 2026 for the new address to be used in the first round. If the legal documents are not received by the closing date 15 January 2026, the application will be processed using your current address in the first round.

The council might ask for more proof if there's any doubt about your move.

Moving before the closing date?

If you're planning to move into Milton Keynes before the closing date for applications, 15 January, you should:

- Complete the Milton Keynes school application as if you're already a resident.
- Include a letter confirming your move details—such as:
 - Your new address
 - Expected move date
 - Any supporting documents (e.g. signed by all parties tenancy agreement, solicitor's letter confirming exchange of contracts for a purchased property, or council tax reference)

This helps the admissions team treat your application as local, which may affect your chances of getting a preferred school.

For more details, check the Milton Keynes City Council school admissions page or the Planning to Move House section in this guide.

Moving after the closing date?

You'll need to fill out a new 'late application' form and must send proof of your new address. This could be a signed lease or rental agreement (covering beyond 1 September 2026), or a solicitor's letter confirming exchange of contracts or completion date.

We will use your new address for correspondence purposes. The application will be looked at in later rounds of school place allocations.

Joint residence arrangements

If you and your child's other parent live at separate addresses but share responsibility for your child:

- The council will require a written statement from both parents explaining how your child splits time between the two homes.
- If your child lives equally at both addresses, you must choose and agree on one address to use for the school application.
- If there's disagreement, or your child spends more time at one home, we may ask for official proof of their main home—such as the address of the parent who receives child benefit.
- If there's a court order about where your child lives, that will take priority over any written agreement between parents.

Choosing schools for your child – what you need to know

When applying for school places in Milton Keynes:

- You can list up to four schools on your application, in order of preference.
- There's no guaranteed place at any school, even if you list it—places are offered based on the school's published oversubscription criteria, not just your choice.

How It Works

- We use something called the Equal Preference Scheme. It treats each school you've listed as a separate application.
- If there's space at your highest preference school, and you have applied for this school, your child will get a place.
- If that school is full, we look at your next preferences.
- If none of your choices can offer a place, your child will be placed at the next nearest school with space available. This may not be your catchment school, if you have not selected this school as a preference on the application.

Tips to help you choose

- Some schools are full every year, so think carefully about which ones you select.
- Include your catchment school as one of your choices—it increases your chances of getting a nearby school place.
- Think about how your child will travel to and from school. The council doesn't provide transport unless you meet the criteria in the School Travel Support Policy.

Where to find school information

• Visit school websites for details like inspection reports, achievement tables, uniforms, and open days. You can also check Ofsted's website for inspection results. www.reports.ofsted.gov.uk

Important reminders

- Each preference is treated fairly—you won't lose out by listing more than one school.
- Schools don't see the order in which you've ranked your preferences.
- Each school has its own rules for how places are allocated (called oversubscription criteria). We have provided you with a snapshot of how places were allocated last year in this guide. However, this information is historical and will not necessarily reflect what will happen this year.
- Check Section E for summaries or visit each school's website.

How to maximise your chance of getting your preferred school?

Choose wisely

- **Understand the oversubscription critera:** Each school has its own rules for prioritising applicants—check these carefully.
- **Review last year's allocations:** Look at when schools stopped accepting applications to gauge your chances.
- Don't assume priority: Attending a linked infant school doesn't guarantee a place at the junior school.
- **Include your catchment school:** If you don't list it, you may not receive a place at the school—even if you live nearby.
- **Transport:** Make sure you can realistically get your child to the school you choose.

Use all four preferences

- **Four chances,** not one: Each preference is treated separately, so use all four to increase your chances.
- Order of preference matters—but only if you get multiple offers: If more than one of your school preferences can offer a place, we will always offer your highest preference school.
- **Include your catchment school:** It doesn't have to be your first choice, but listing it improves your chances of being allocated a place at a nearby school.

Applying to schools outside Milton Keynes

If you live in Milton Keynes and pay council tax to Milton Keynes City Council, but want to apply for a school outside the area (e.g. in Buckinghamshire), here's what to do:

Application process

- You must still complete a Milton Keynes school application—even if the school is in another council's area.
- The school's local authority will coordinate with Milton Keynes City Council to check for available places.

Research before you apply

- Contact the council of the school you're applying to (e.g. Buckinghamshire Council) and request their admissions information.
- This helps you understand:
 - Oversubscription criteria
 - Catchment areas
 - Transport policies
 - Any additional documentation required

Siblings

Including sibling details in your application can make a real difference—many schools give priority to children with siblings already attending.

For admissions, a sibling is:

- A brother or sister by whole or half blood
- An adopted child
- Any child who permanently lives at the same address and for whom the parent has parental responsibility.
 - So it's broader than just biological siblings—what matters is shared address and legal responsibility
- Not all schools treat sibling priority the same—review each school's admissions criteria carefully.

Always include sibling details in your application—it's your responsibility.

Sibling information is verified with the school, so accuracy matters. You must indicate where siblings have a different family name.

Multiple births

If you're applying for school places and have twins, triplets, or other multiples, here's how Milton Keynes City Council will consider the children:

• If there's only one place left at a school and the next child on the waiting list is part of a multiple birth group (e.g. twins or triplets): All siblings will be admitted, even if this means going over the school's official published admission number.

Why this matters

- This policy ensures that siblings aren't separated during school admissions.
- It applies to all year groups, not just Reception or Year 7

Looked after children and previously looked after children

Looked after

These are children currently:

- In the care of a local council, or
- Living in accommodation provided by the council's social services at the time the school application is made.

Previously looked after

These are children who were in care but have since:

- Been adopted, or
- Have a child arrangements order or special guardianship order. This also includes children who appear (to the admissions authority) to have been in state care outside of England.

If this applies to your child, make sure you tick the correct box or include these details in your application, so they can be prioritised.

School admissions for children with Special Educational Needs (SEN)

All children deserve equal access to education — and that includes those with special educational needs. Children with SEN are treated just like any other applicant when it comes to school admissions.

No refusal based on needs

Schools cannot refuse a place simply by saying they aren't able to meet your child's needs. The local council will look at every application fairly, using the same over-subscription criteria as for any other child.

Make sure to share details about your child's needs in the application, so they can be properly supported from the start.

School admissions for children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP)

If your child has an EHCP that names a particular school, here's what you need to know:

- Under Section 324 of the Education Act 1996, any child with an EHCP naming a school must be admitted to that school. This applies even if the school is full. It's not affected by over-subscription criteria
- If your child arrives outside the normal application period, the school still must admit them, as long as the EHCP names that school.

Special provision in primary schools for children with learning needs

Every primary school is set up to help support children who have specific or moderate learning difficulties — including those with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

If your child:

- Already has an EHCP, or
- Is currently being assessed for one

You're encouraged to speak with the school's Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCo). They'll explain the support the school provides and help make sure your child's individual needs are met.

School admissions for children of UK service personnel

If you're in the armed forces or a Crown servant returning from overseas, here's how school admissions in Milton Keynes will support your family:

What the admission authority will do:

- Consider your child's needs, as outlined in the school's over-subscription criteria (for Community and Voluntary Controlled schools)
- Offer a place before you arrive if you provide an official letter (e.g. from MOD, FCO, or GCHQ)
 confirming your posting
- Prioritise based on service premium if you provide evidence your child receives it
- Accept alternative addresses such as a unit postal address or nearest 'quartering area' address, even if you don't yet have a new home

In-Year Admissions:

- School places must be taken up by the beginning of the next term
- The council won't hold places in bulk or refuse a child just because the family doesn't live in the area yet
- Late applications will be treated as 'on time' as much as possible giving families flexibility

Travelling to school: what to consider

Before accepting a school place, consider how your child will travel there — safely and reliably.

Walking

- For children aged 4 to 7, the Government expects they can walk up to 2 miles to access school
- For children aged 8 or older, up to 3 miles is considered reasonable, as long as there's a safe walking route.

Public transport

- Check if there's a suitable bus or train route that lines up with the school's start and end times
- Consider access, wait times, and reliability, especially in poor weather

Travelling by car

- Is there safe and available parking near the school?
- Be mindful to park considerately this protects children's safety and keeps things smooth for the wider community.

Deferred entry to school

All children can start school in September after they turn 4 years old.

Parents can defer a child's start date until later in the same school year.

However:

- Your child must start full-time education by the term after their 5th birthday—this is when school becomes compulsory.
- You can't delay beyond the start of the final term of the school year you applied for.
 So, while you can delay the start, your child will still need to be in school before the end of that year.

Children born between:	Must start school on or before	Starting year group:
1 September 2020 and 31 December 2020	January 2026 (Spring term)	Reception
1 January 2021 and 31 March 2021	April 2026 (Summer term)	Reception

Admission outside of normal year group (including summer born children)— What parents need to know

As your Local Authority, we understand that every child's educational journey is unique. While it may seem helpful to delay a child's school start or keep them back a year, — known as admission outside of normal year group— we do not support this approach as a general practice.

Why we advise against it

Educating a child outside their age group can lead to long-term challenges:

- School transitions may be disrupted if future schools don't agree to keep your child in a lower year group.
- Social and emotional development can be affected by being out of sync with peers.
- Academic progress may be slower than peers who receive targeted support.
- Post-16 education options may be limited due to age restrictions.
- Support may end early, especially in Year 11, when statutory school age ends.

What we recommend

Support should be tailored within the child's current year group, including:

- One-to-one or small group teaching.
- Curriculum adjustments
- Emotional and social support
- Collaboration between families, schools, and professionals

If you're concerned about your child's readiness, speak with their nursery, prospective school, or professionals involved in their care. Together, we can find the right support.

Summer born children – starting school at age 5

Parents of children born between 1 April and 31 August can request they start Reception at age 5 instead of going straight into Year 1 (outside of normal year group). The final decision rests with the admissions authority for the school, which must make this decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case and in the child's best interests.

How to make a request

- Apply for a school place at the usual time (age 3–4).
- Submit a request form to Milton Keynes City Council, available on our website.
- Email the form and supporting documents to: primaryadmissions@milton-keynes.gov.uk

What to include

- Information in regard to your child's academic, social, and emotional development
- Medical or professional assessments

It's strongly recommended to speak with your preferred school before submitting a request.

Things to consider

- The final decision rests with the preference school's admissions authority, which must make this decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case and in the child's best interests.
- Starting outside the normal age group may affect future transitions to junior or secondary school.

Junior school transfer - what you need to know

Who needs to apply?

- Children currently in Year 2 at an infant school in Milton Keynes.
- Born between 1 September 2018 and 31 August 2019.
- These children must transfer to a junior school for Year 3 starting September 2026.

How to apply

- Apply online via the Milton Keynes School Admissions Citizen's Portal.
- The deadline for applications is 15 January 2026.
- Milton Keynes City Council coordinates this process as part of the normal admissions cycle.

Which schools can you choose?

- You can only apply to junior schools that are set up to admit children at this stage.
- Each school's admissions arrangements determine eligibility—check these carefully.

What if the school you want is not listed?

If your preferred school isn't on the list of schools accepting applications for the next school year, here's what you need to know:

All-through primary schools

- Most all-through primary schools in Milton Keynes only accept new pupils in Reception.
- They usually don't offer extra places in other year groups for coordinated admissions unless stated in their published admissions policy.

Applying later (in-year)

- You can apply to these schools at any time using an in-year application.
- A place will only be offered if there's a vacancy, and your child would need to start straight away.

What you should do now

To make sure your child has a school place for next September, it's best to:

- Apply for and accept a place at one of the listed schools.
- If you still want a different school, you can submit an in-year application in June to be considered for a September start.

Keep in mind: Most all-through primary schools will likely be full by then, since Reception is their main entry point.

Applying for a place outside of Milton Keynes if you are a Milton Keynes resident (relevant to Little Brickhill, Woburn Sands, Bow Brickhill, Hanslope, Castlethorpe and Stony Stratford)

Coordinated admissions

Apply through Milton Keynes

- You must use the Milton Keynes application process, even if you're applying to schools outside the area.
- All schools use their own oversubscription criteria to decide who gets a place—check these carefully before applying.

Choosing your preferences

- You can list up to four schools.
- It's strongly recommended to include your catchment school—this improves your chances of getting a nearby place.
- If you don't list any Milton Keynes schools and your outside-area choices are full, your child will be placed at a Milton Keynes school that has an available space in the year group, which may not be the catchment school.

Transport considerations

- If your child is offered a place outside Milton Keynes, you're responsible for transport.
- Milton Keynes City Council does not provide transport to schools outside the area (except for High Ash CofE Primary School in specific cases).
- Talk to the council where the school is located to understand transport options.

In-year school admissions

If you're applying for a school place outside the usual entry points (like Reception or Year 7), here's what you need to know:

How to apply

For schools outside Milton Keynes, you must apply through the council where the school is located.

Admission criteria and availability

- Every school uses its own oversubscription criteria to rank applications—check these before applying.
- In-year admissions depend on available spaces at the time of your application. If your chosen school is full, your child may not get a place.

Transport responsibility

• If your child is offered a school place outside Milton Keynes, you must arrange transport.

Milton Keynes City Council does not provide transport to schools outside its area. You should discuss transport options with the relevant council before making your application

You are advised to also apply for schools in Milton Keynes via the Milton Keynes Citizen Portal. If your application is unsuccessful as many schools will already be full at this point, you will be allocated a place at a school with vacancy.

Who should apply in-year?

- Families needing a school place outside the normal entry points (Reception or Year 7) part-way through the year .
- Those moving into or within Milton Keynes or coming from overseas.

How to apply

- Apply online through the council's Citizen's Portal on the Milton Keynes City Council website.
- Provide proof of your move (e.g. council tax bill/number or a tenancy agreement or a solicitor's letter stating contracts have been exchanged on a purchased property).
- Submit completed paper application forms to the Access to Education Team, visit the in-year page on Milton Keynes City Council website for further information.

In year application coordination

- The council coordinates admissions for most schools in Milton Keynes.
- The application will either be processed by the council or forwarded to the admission authority of the school.
- Some schools may ask you to fill out their own supplementary form.
- The council holds a waiting list for:
 - Community schools
 - Voluntary controlled schools
 - Some schools that are their own admissions authority

Other schools (e.g. academies, foundation, voluntary aided) may not hold waiting lists—you'll need to contact them directly. You can find a list of schools that manage their own admissions on the Milton Keynes City Council website.

Section B The application process

You MUST supply your council tax reference number so that the admissions team can verify your home address

Make sure you submit your application before the closing date of

15 January 2026


Applications made after this date will be late and not processed until May 2026



If you are moving house, you must provide proof of your new address by the closing date. The admissions team may contact you to request further evidence of your intended house move

National Offer Day 16 APRIL 2026

You will receive notification of the school place that has been offered



Contact the school direct to confirm what arrangements are in place

Choose wisely - you could disadvantage yourself if you don't use your opportunity to express a preference for four schools.

Don't assume you will be allocated a place at your catchment school if you don't state it as one of your preferences.

Don't assume your child will get priority just because they attend a Nursery class attached to your preferred school

If a place is declined at a school of preference, your child's name will be placed on the waiting list Waiting lists will be held until 31 December 2026

Information on how to appeal is available on the council's website

Key Points to Remember

We cannot offer your child a school until you make an application. You will not just automatically be given a school place. Attendance at a nursery class attached to a school does not guarantee a place.

You MUST submit an application

It is best to include your catchment school, even if you put it lower on your application than other schools.

This is because you may not get your school of preference and yet the catchment school may fill up with those who have applied.

There is no guarantee of a place at your catchment school.

Remember, if you are not sure about any part of the process, just email or telephone us and we can give you more information and advice.

Having a sibling at the school does not guarantee admission but make sure you include your other child's details on your application, as it may mean you are given higher priority for a place.

You should list the schools in the order you would like them, not the order you think you might be offered them.

You are advised to list four schools. Putting just one school doesn't give you a better chance of getting it.

Starting school – compulsory age

By law, children must start school at the beginning of the term after their 5th birthday.

In Milton Keynes, children born between **1 September 2021** and **31 August 2022** can start full-time school in **September 2026**.

Some schools may offer a short part-time induction period to help children settle in.

Infant Class Size legislation

There is a legal requirement that infant classes may not contain more than 30 children with a single teacher. This applies to the below:

- Reception, Year 1, and Year 2 classes must not exceed 30 pupils per teacher.
- If a class is full, schools must refuse additional applications unless one of the legal exceptions applies.

The infant class size legislation makes allowances for the entry of an additional child in very limited circumstances. These pupils will remain an 'excepted pupil' for the time they are in an infant class or until the numbers fall back to the current infant class size limit.

The only exceptions are:

- 1. Children with an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) naming the school.
- 2. Looked after or previously looked after children admitted outside the normal round.
- 3. Children admitted due to a procedural error in the original application.
- 4. Children admitted after a successful appeal.
- 5. Children who move into the area and have no other school within reasonable distance.
- 6. Children of UK service personnel.
- 7. Twins or multiple birth siblings when one is admitted.
- 8. Children with special educational needs who attend some mainstream infant classes.

Note: These exceptions apply only to Reception–Year 2. Years 3–6 are not subject to class size legislation.

Applying online - step-by-step

- You can apply from 2 September 2025 at the Milton Keynes School Citizen's Portal. You must apply by 15 January 2026
- No advantage to applying early: Applications are treated equally as long as they're submitted by the deadline.
- Visit schools before applying to feel confident about your preferences.
- Create a username (your email) and password.
- Set up a secret question and answer in case you forget your password.
- After completing the form, make sure to submit it—you'll get a confirmation email once it's received.
- On 16 April 2026, you can log back in to see which school place has been offered

Making changes before the deadline

- You can view and amend your online application until midnight Thursday 15 January 2026.
- If you make changes, you must resubmit the application and parental declaration—otherwise, it won't be submitted.

Paper applications

- If you prefer paper:
 - Post it to: Access to Education Team Civic, 1 Saxon Gate East Milton Keynes, MK9 3EJ Must arrive by 5pm on 15 January 2026
 - Or hand it in to your current infant school by 12 noon on 15 January 2026.

Applications received after the closing date will not be processed in the first round.

Late applications – what you need to know

- Only applications received by 15 January 2026 will be considered for offers on National Offer Day (16 April 2026).
- Late applications (submitted after the deadline) will be reviewed after National Offer Day.
- Outcomes for late applications in the second round will be sent by letter on 29 May 2026.

If your preferred school is full

- Your child will be offered a place at the next nearest school with available space.
- They'll also be automatically added to waiting lists for your preferred schools—but only for the Autumn term.

Waiting list

- Waiting lists are ranked using each school's oversubscription criteria.
- This means some late applicants may be placed higher than on-time applicants if they meet a higher criteria.

Requesting a change of school preference – what you need to know

After the closing date

- You cannot change your preferences once the 15 January 2026 deadline has passed.
- If you want to make a change, you'll need to submit a new late application.
- This new application will be treated as late and only considered after all on-time applications have been processed.

Exceptional circumstances

The council may accept a change without penalty if there are exceptional circumstances.

Each case is reviewed individually—there's no guarantee it will be accepted.

Even if accepted, your application will still be processed using:

- The School Admissions Code
- Each school's oversubscription criteria

Application processing timeline and procedure

January-March 2026

- The council will process all on-time applications during this period.
- If you've listed a foundation, voluntary aided school, or academy, your child's details will be passed to that school.
 - These schools apply their own oversubscription criteria.
- For community and voluntary controlled schools, the council applies the criteria directly.

Applying outside Milton Keynes

- If you've applied to a school in another council's area, Milton Keynes will forward your child's details to that council.
- That council will follow its own procedures and notify Milton Keynes if a place can be offered.

Equal preference scheme

Schools do not see the order in which you ranked them.

Each preference is considered independently, based on:

- Your child's details
- The school's oversubscription criteria

If more than one school preference can be offered, your child will be offered a place at the highest preference school on your application.

How home to school distance is measured

Milton Keynes City Council uses a computerised geographical information system (GIS). Every home, school, redway, and path junction has a unique reference point. This allows the system to calculate the shortest route from your home to the school.

There are two types of distance measurements, depending on the school's admissions policy:

- Straight-line distance: "as the crow flies" from home to school.
- Shortest available walking route: using paths, underpasses, and redways.

All applicants are measured using the same system, ensuring a fair and consistent approach.

National Offer Day – 16 April 2026

If you applied online

- Log in to the Milton Keynes City Council website to view your child's school offer.
- You'll also receive an automated email confirming the placement.

If you applied by paper

• A letter will be sent by second class post with your child's school offer.

If no preferred school is offered

- Your child will be offered a place at the next nearest school with availability.
- Their name will be added to the waiting list for any schools where a place was declined.
- You'll be informed of your right to appeal the decision.

If you are happy with the offer

- For Milton Keynes schools only No action is needed—your child's place will be automatically accepted.
- The council assumes acceptance unless you explicitly decline.
- If you wish to accept a school place in another council area, please check with the relevant council how to do this.

If you are declining the offer

You must email primaryadmissions@milton-keynes.gov.uk.

Include:

- Your child's full name
- Date of birth
- Details of where your child will be educated in September 2026 the place will not be removed until this is confirmed

What comes next

The school will send you an admissions pack with key information and next steps.

If you've been declined a place by any of your higher preference schools, your child will remain on the waiting list for these schools and you'll retain the right to appeal.

Waiting lists

After 16 April 2026:

- If a school is oversubscribed, a waiting list will be created.
- If your child is not offered a place at a preferred school, their name will be automatically added to that school's waiting list.

How children are ranked

Waiting lists are ordered using the school's published oversubscription criteria.

- Lists are maintained until 31 December 2026.
- After that, contact the individual school to see if they continue to hold a list.

This means:

- Late applications can sometimes rank higher than on-time ones if they meet stronger criteria.
- The date of application does not determine position on the list.

Your rights

- Being on a waiting list does not affect your right to appeal.
- You can pursue both the waiting list and an appeal simultaneously.

Note: Milton Keynes Council holds waiting lists for community and voluntary controlled schools, while academies, foundation, and voluntary aided schools may manage their own lists. You can find more details on the Milton Keynes City Council website.

Waiting list movement

Your child's position on the waiting list can go up or down.

This depends on:

- New applicants joining the list
- How each child ranks under the school's oversubscription criteria

Automatic overrides

If a place becomes available at a preferred school:

- Your child may be automatically allocated to that school.
- This will replace the previously offered place.

Don't want to stay on the waiting list?

If you're happy with the current offer and want to opt out of waiting lists,

email: primaryadmissions@milton-keynes.gov.uk

• Include your child's name, date of birth, and a clear statement that you wish to be removed from waiting lists.

Not happy with your child's school allocation?

It's completely understandable to feel disappointed if your child wasn't offered a place at one of your preferred schools. Fortunately, there are several steps you can take:

Visit the allocated school

- Even if it wasn't your first choice, visiting the school can give you a better sense of its environment, staff, and facilities.
- Many families find they're pleasantly surprised after a visit.

Waiting lists

- If you are declined a preferred school, your child is automatically placed on its waiting list.
- Places may become available if other families decline their offers or move away.

Late applications

- You can apply to other schools that still have places.
- Be aware: all late applications are ranked according to each school's oversubscription criteria, so priority isn't guaranteed.

Appeal the decision

- You have the right to appeal if your child was not offered a place at a higher preference school you applied for.
- Appeals are heard by an Independent Appeal Panel and must be submitted within 20 school days of receiving your allocation letter.
- For Milton Keynes community or voluntary controlled schools, email: primaryadmissions@milton-keynes.gov.uk.
- Appeals for academies or foundation schools are handled by the schools themselves.

You'll need to:

- Submit a separate appeal for each school
- Provide strong supporting evidence (e.g. medical, social, or educational reasons)
- Be prepared for a formal hearing process

You can find full guidance on the Milton Keynes City Council appeals page.

Refusing a school place

If you're considering declining the Milton Keynes school place your child has been offered, here's how the process works and what to keep in mind:

Can you refuse the place?

- Yes, you can inform Milton Keynes City Council that you wish to refuse the place.
- However, the offer won't be withdrawn immediately the council must ensure your child has access to education.

When will the offer be removed?

- Only once you've secured alternative education provision (either state or independent).
- You must confirm this with the council before the original offer can be withdrawn.

Why you should hold on to the offer?

It's strongly recommended to keep the offered place while you:

- Appeal for schools that were higher preferences on your original application
- Apply to other schools with available places

Appeals and late applications

- You can appeal for any school you applied to and were refused.
- You can also submit late applications to other schools but these will be ranked according to each school's oversubscription criteria.

Appeals

Community or Voluntary Controlled Schools

Email primaryadmissions@milton-keynes.gov.uk with:

- Your child's name, date of birth, and address
- The school(s) you wish to appeal for

Foundation, Voluntary Aided Schools and Academies

Contact the school directly to request an appeal pack.

Appeal provider

Appeals for community and voluntary controlled schools are managed by Clerks Associates UK.

They:

- Set up hearings
- Distribute paperwork
- Clerk meetings
- Notify families of decisions

Panels are independent and made up of trained local volunteers.

No panel member will have prior involvement in your case or ties to the school.

Appeal timeline

- Hearings are held in the summer term for Reception and Year 3 entry.
- You can accept another school place while your appeal is pending.
- If you decline the offered place, it may be given to another child.

Infant Class Size appeals

Panels can only uphold these if:

The decision was unreasonable or procedures were not correctly followed.

An appeal guide is available on request

SEND appeals

If your child has an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) and you disagree with the placement:

- You can appeal to the SEND and Disability Tribunal
- Contact the SEND Casework Team at (01908) 253414
- You have 2 months from receiving the amended statement (15 February) to appeal

Withdrawing offers of school places - what you should know

If a school place is offered based on false or intentionally misleading information, the admission authority has the right to withdraw the offer. This includes:

- Falsely claiming to live in a school's catchment area
- Providing incorrect details about siblings, special needs, or custody arrangements
- Any other information that gives unfair priority over other applicants

Why it matters

Misleading information can deny a place to a child who genuinely meets the criteria.

Early years provision in Milton Keynes

Before children start formal schooling, they can attend:

- Nursery schools
- Nursery classes attached to primary schools
- Private day nurseries
- Preschools and playgroups
- Childminders

Key points to know

- Admissions criteria for early years settings are separate from school admissions.
- You must apply directly to the nursery or provider not through the school admissions process.
- Each provider may have its own application process, deadlines, and priority criteria.

Where to find details

You can explore all available early years options on the Milton Keynes City Council website, including:

- Lists of registered providers
- Guidance on choosing a setting
- Support for children with special educational needs

Section C School Travel Support

Parental Responsibility

Parents and carers must ensure their children attend school regularly and travel safely to and from school.

School Travel – Who Qualifies?

Milton Keynes City Council provides travel support for children of statutory school age if:

- They attend their catchment school or the nearest appropriate school, and
- They live:
 - Over 2 miles away (if under 8 years old), or
 - Over 3 miles away (if 8 or older), or
 - There is **no safe walking route** under those distances, even with an adult.

Low-Income Families

Children qualify for travel support if they:

- Aged 8-11:
 - Get free school meals or parents receive Universal Credit
 - Attend the nearest catchment school
 - Live between 2 and 6 miles from school

Discretionary Fare Scheme

If your child doesn't qualify for free travel, you may still apply for a **paid seat** on existing school transport (if space is available). These seats can be withdrawn if needed for eligible children.
